Gentle civil rights advocate Florine DuFresne dies in Arizona at 95

"She was the community's conscience. She was just a very loving, accepting person, " said friend **Harriett Wilson** about **Florine DuFresne**, Clark County native.

Mrs. DuFresne, an inveterate letters-to-the-letter writer, almost always in support of civil rights, died at the home of her daughter **Ann Beach** in Chandler, Ariz., Saturday. She was 95.

Mrs. DuFresne was born in Hazel Dell in 1907, attended Hough School and graduated from Vancouver High School in 1925.

Mrs. DuFresne's husband, **Ron**, who died in 1980, founded Vancouver Funeral Home in 1936. In addition to Ann, Mrs. FuFresne is survived by daughters **Nyle Hallman**, Honolulu, Hawaii, **Miriam LeGare**, Sacramento, Calif., and **Janette Hopper**, Templeton, Calif.

A memorial service will be at 10 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 15, in the First United Methodist Church, 401 E 33rd Street.

Clark College master plan subject of two meetings on Wednesday

Two open houses for public review of the Clark College master plan are at 3:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 12, in the Gaiser Hall central boardroom.

Clark's plan covers use of the campus and construction of future buildings, which may be off campus, over the period of six to twelve years.

One of Clark's new buildings, a classroom that would serve 400 students, will be on the Washington State University Vancouver campus.

Other off-campus locations under consideration are in east Vancouver, according to interim president **David Beyer**.
