John Davis named interim superintendent for Washington School for the Deaf

John Davis, retired Hockinson School District Superintendent, has been appointed interim superintendent of the Washington School for the Deaf by Gov. **Gary Locke**.

Pat Clothier, chair of the school's board of trustees, said, "We are extremely confident in his ability to bring staff, students and parents together to create positive environment."

Today is Davis's first official day on the job, although he has been on campus meeting with teachers and Clothier. Davis succeeds **Leonard Aron**, who resigned his position after five tumultuous years.

Locke says of Davis, "He has a distinguished history of achievement and dedication to children throughout the state of Washington."

While his stay at the school is expected to be brief, Davis says it will be much like a relay race. "I will work as hard as I can to ensure that the hand-off to a new administration is smooth."

After retiring from the Hockinson district two years ago, Davis has been interim director of KWRL, a transportation cooperative serving Kalama, Woodland, Ridgefield and La Center.
