City council expected to hire architect for Firstenburg Community Center Monday

At its Monday meeting the Vancouver City Council is expected to award a \$1.8 million professional services contract to Opsis Architecture, Portland, for design and permitting services for the \$18 million Firstenburg Community Center.

The center to be on NE 136th Avenue, north of Mill Plain Boulevard, is being financed by a \$15 million bond issue supported by real estate excise taxes and a recent \$3 million contribution from **Ed** and **Mary Firstenburg**.

When completed in 2005, the center will provide east Vancouver with recreational, cultural, educational and meeting facilities.

Hough Pool re-opens to the public Saturday

The Hough swimming pool, in the Hough Elementary School, 1900 Daniels Street, re-opens to the public this weekend.

Hours are 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Fees are \$2.25 to \$3.25, depending on age.

Title to the \$1.6 million pool, financed by the Hough Foundation and turned over to the City of Vancouver, will revert to the foundation March 28. Public swimming hours are expected to be expanded after that.

Budget tightening at City Hall has reduced the amount of city support for the facility. However, the city council has agreed to provide \$75,000 for 2003 and \$50,000 for 2004.

Clark Public Utilities ends year in the black

Clark Public Utilities ended 2002 with a net income of \$1.5 million, although that was below the \$9.8 million revenue figure estimated at the beginning of the year.

The reason is lower than expected power sales despite an increase of 4,400 customers during the year. The electric utility ended the year with 160,000 residential, commercial and industrial customers.

The culprit in Clark's sales decline was warmer than usual weather, according to finance director **Rick Dyer**.

Clark is expected to increase electric rates in April when a forecasted 8 percent wholesale hike from Bonneville Power Administration becomes effective.

Congressional delegation puts heat on BPA to avoid October rate increase

All members of the Washington congressional delegation have been pressuring Bonneville Power Administration to "find creative ways" of avoiding another wholesale power increase in October.

BPA is expected to raise rates 8 percent in April. A second increase being considered in the fall could be as high as 20 percent.

BPA contracts with its customers allow it to make rate corrections depending on a variety of factors affecting its ability to maintain solvency and make regular loan payments to the federal government.
