

Six-story Public Service Building dedicated

The Clark County Public Service Building, 1300 Franklin Street, which cost \$22.4 million to build but is expected to save the county \$46 million in office rental and lease costs over the 25-year life of bonds, was dedicated Tuesday as a crowd of about 200 invited guests looked on.

Downtown Vancouver's most recently completed major office building will house most county offices, and some of those will be joined by city of Vancouver counterparts to help provide citizens with one-stop shopping.

Notable exceptions are county auditor automobile licensing facilities and the auditor's election offices, both of which remain in separate locations.

The six-floor building, designed by Barrantine Bates Lee and built by Swinerton Builders in 18 months, is just north of the county courthouse, which is now being remodeled to provide new courtroom space.

Legacy Salmon Creek Hospital presents its case to county commissioners next Tuesday

Legacy Health System and Clark County transportation staff have worked out a public-private partnership agreement that could pave the way for construction to begin soon on Legacy Salmon Creek Hospital facilities at NE 139th Street and NE 20th Avenue, near the I-5, I-205 confluence with NE 134th Street, at what is becoming the commercial heart of unincorporated Salmon Creek.

The plans worked out between Legacy and the county would ease access at the county's most crowded traffic intersection and will become feasible when the county reduces its traffic standards for the 134th Street corridor from 22 miles an hour to 13 miles an hour.

County commissioners will review the agreement at a

10 a.m. Tuesday, March 25, hearing in the Public Service Building.

The agreement would also lift the development moratorium imposed on the corridor more than a year ago.

According to the agreement Legacy would cover the cost of widening the northbound exit off I-5 at 134th Street to four lanes, connecting 134th and 139th Streets with NE 24th Avenue and widening NE 139th Street to accommodate left turn lanes between 20th and 29th Avenues.

The county would build three additional lanes on 134th Street between I-5 and I-205, and build an I-5 overpass as part of 139th Street.

The Legacy Salmon Creek Hospital schedule, according to **Joe Kunkel**, administrator, is to begin construction of a parking structure and medical office building this year, completing those structures and a 220-bed hospital in mid-2005.
