Vancouver police will use "less lethal" Taser against violent, combative perps

Vancouver police, who have been training to use the "less lethal" Taser tool against violent and combative individuals, will demonstrate the use of the high-energy electrical device at a news conference at 1:30 p.m. Friday, March 28, in the Northwest Regional Training Center.

Tasers were developed in the 1970s as a tool to provide airline personnel with a way of combating potential hijackers.

The M26 Taser to be demonstrated by Vancouver officers will stop a person up to 21 feet away by firing a double pronged set of wires charged with up to 500,000 volts of electricity.

The electrical shock immobilizes the target but does no permanent harm.

The demonstration includes the opportunity for members of the news media to experience firsthand the affects of the Taser.

Locke says 3-cent a gallon gasoline tax proposal is a transportation 'start'

Gov. **Gary Locke** today said the 3-cent a gallon gasoline tax proposed by House Transportation Committee Chair **Ed Murray** (D-Seattle) is a "start" in delivering transportation improvements.

Locke said, however, "The state needs a gasoline tax increase of four or five cents a gallon to address long delayed transportation improvements that are needed to ensure a healthy economy for the state."

According to Locke, every one-cent-a-gallon increase would raise \$500 million over ten years for highway construction and would generate up to 3,000 family-wage jobs.

"A solution is within our reach," Locke said "We need to pass a transportation budget by the end of the month."

County growth appears to be slowing in 2003

A total of 460 new residential electric hookups were added to Clark Public Utilities customer base during the first two months this year, compared to 742 during January and February 2002.
