Transportation Finance Task Force to try to help city find \$15 million-a-year for roads

Facing a \$15 million annual shortfall in transportation funding and the end of the its capital transportation program in 2004, Vancouver is turning to a new task force to identify and help implement strategies to replace that shortfall.

The task force is charged with finding a means of financing both transportation improvements and maintenance of the existing transportation system.

Says city transportation manager **Thayer Rorabaugh**, "Unlike other transportation initiatives that ask the question, 'What are the taxpayers willing to pay for?' this task force will attempt to answer the question , 'how?'"

The task force, represented by members from the city council, neighborhoods, businesses, schools, hospitals and citizens at-large, holds its first public meeting at 6 p.m. Thursday, April 10, in the Water Resources Education Center. The task force is expected to continue its meetings over the next four to six months.

Food facts: 4,400 tons collected in 7 years

In a matter-of-fact way, with no explanations added, **Dale Denny** president of Northwest Harvest South presents sobering statistics on poverty in Clark County.

Vancouver-headquartered Northwest Harvest South, which provides donated foot for local food banks, along with Walk and Knock and the Postal Workers annual collections, have provided needy families in the county with over 8.8 million pounds of food over the past seven years, according to Denny.

The 2002 poverty guideline for annual income was \$8,860 for a single person, \$11,940 for two persons and \$21,180 for a family of five.

Last year nearly one in ten Clark County residents, 31,027, had below poverty-level incomes. Food stamps were given to 22,094 persons. SHARE served 135,308 meals. St. Vincent de Paul helped 53,601 persons. The Salvation Army helped 17,968 families.

The Free Clinic treated 4,454 adults and 1,078 children. Clark County schools provided free or reduced price lunches for 22,087 students
