Local Lewis and Clark Bicentennial commemoration begins in May

The Vancouver/Clark County Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Committee, headed by co chairs county commissioner Judie Stanton and Mayor Royce Pollard will kick off a three year commemoration of the Lewis and Clark exploration with a lunch at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday, May 14, in the Water Resources Education Center.

The keynote speaker is **Stephen Dow Beckham**, author of Lewis and Clark in the Pacific Northwest, who will talk about the two leaders and America's commitment to enlightenment. Also participating in the program will be Chinook Tribal council member Sam Robinson and Cowlitz Tribal council member Mike Iyall.

The lunch, which costs \$30, will be followed on the same day by two free public events, a demonstration of medicine and medical techniques of 200 years ago by historian **Gary Lenz** from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Clark County Historical Museum, 1511 Main Street, and a presentation on languages and cultures Lewis and Clark confronted, at the O.O. Howard House beginning at 6 p.m.

The Lewis and Clark expedition to the Pacific Ocean began in Missouri on May 14, 1804, concluding in the summer of 1806.

The local committee has been working nearly two years to prepare Clark County's participation in the national commemoration.

The explorers' Corps of Discovery spent several days in Clark County, in the fall of 1805 as they moved toward the Pacific Ocean, and again on their return east in the

Numbers of commemorative activities are planned locally and in conjunction with national events.

Probably the most significant project for Vancouver will be a commemorative structure or structures by famed artist-architect Maya Lin, designer of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial on the mall in Washington, D.C.

Current thinking would have Lin designing a pedestrian and bicycle overpass crossing Highway 14 (the Lewis and Clark Highway) and the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad tracks, connecting Fort Vancouver with the Columbia River shore, the site of original Hudson's Bay Company wharves.

Vancouver and Portland have joined in a project that would produce a greatly expanded trail system connecting Lewis and Clark sites on both sides of the Columbia River.

The National Fish and Wildlife Service has plans for reconstruction of one of the plank houses Lewis and Clark visited along the Columbia River at the ancient Indian town of Cathlapotle near Ridgefield.

A Capt. William Clark park on Cottonwood Park in Washougal currently is in the development phase.
