Library board votes to filter computers

The 7-member Fort Vancouver Regional Library District Board of Trustees voted Monday night, at its regular monthly meeting in Stevenson, to approve full district compliance with the terms of the federal Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA).

The vote means the library district will equip all Internet computers with filtering software to block from minors legal obscenity, child pornography and material "harmful to minors."

Compliance with the CIPA, declared constitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court on June 23, 2003, is required in order for libraries to receive federal "erate" subsidies for Internet access and Internet-related grants under the Library Services and Technology Act.

CREAM Collection nets thousands of pounds of discarded computer equipment

Computer Reuse and Recycling (CREAM) collected nearly 7,000 pounds of unwanted computers and computer-related electronics during a special collection event at Clark Community College last Friday.

More than 100 participants recycled 141 computers, 95 monitors, 65 printers, 39 televisions and various other electronic items. The event, sponsored by Clark County Public Works, the Clark County Sheriff, and Clark College, was held as part of Clark County's Household Hazardous Waste Awareness Week.

CREAM is a partnership between Clark County Public Works, the Clark County Sheriff, the City of Vancouver, Clark College, Columbia Resource Company and the Salvation Army. Used computers are refurbished and reformatted by Clark College and donated to the Salvation Army for distribution throughout Clark County. Computers that cannot be reused are disassembled and the materials recyled.

In addition to computers, monitors and other computerrelated items, televisions, printers, answering machines, video cassette recorders, typewriters, facsimile machines, cell phones and other electronics are accepted free of charge.
