## Ellen Van de Water, sight failing, withdraws from Fort Vancouver Tapestry Project

Ellen Van de Water, the inspiration for, and founding director of, the Fort Vancouver Tapestry Project, has resigned from the board due to failing eye sight, reports **Sherry Mowatt**, managing director of the project.

Van de Water, well known local artist, has drawn the first half of the more than 40 panels that will make up the 108-foot-long tapestry depicting the history of Vancouver and the northwest.

Remaining 30-inch-tall panels are being drawn by Mowatt, who has been with the project since its inception.

According to Van de Water, who is writing her memoirs, the tapestry is the only known example in North America of the ancient art of stitched narrative tapestry. It will go on display at the Vancouver National Historic Reserve in time for the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial commemoration in 2005.

Volunteers from throughout the region have been stitching the panels in a special tapestry work room at the Washington School for the Deaf.

Drop-in visiting is encouraged, says Mowatt. The work room is open from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday each week. For further information, call **992-0975**.
