## Battle Ground Neighborhood Association reaching out to school district organizations

The Battle Ground Neighborhood Association, which includes the entire city of Battle Ground and is the largest association in the county, is forming, with organizations within the larger Battle Ground School District area, a committee to inform voters of school district issues and to increase voter registration.

An organizational meeting is being held at 11 a.m. Saturday, June 14, in the Battle Ground High School cafeteria, reports Battle Ground association president **Bradley Scott**.

According to Scott all neighborhood associations within the school district boundaries will be uniting in the project with parent-teacher association organizations and student body members from both Battle Ground and Prairie High Schools.

Although Battle Ground has not yet proposed a bond issue this year, The district is considering a request to the city and Clark County to more than double impact fees.

#### 40,000 garbage carts coming to Vancouver

Delivery of 40,000 garbage carts for Vancouver garbage customers begins in June, but it will take nearly nine months before distribution to all city customers is completed.

The garbage containers are being provided free by the city and come in four sizes, ranging from 20 to 96 gallons. Customers will be given containers that match their current garbage capacity unless they opt for a different size.

Both of the city's garbage haulers, Waste Connections and Waste Management are involved in the change over from privately owned garbage cans to the carts designed to be used with an automated system.

Garbage pickups will be made with trucks outfitted with an articulated arm that picks up the cart and dumps the contents into the truck in a single motion.

The carts that are on wheels, also have permanently attached lids.

Residents will be notified within two weeks of the arrival of their new containers. For further information, call Vancouver solid waste manager **Rich McConaghy**, **696-8186**.
