# New chief praises medical center, offers community cooperation

Southwest Washington Medical Center, the largest employer (over 3,000 people) in southwest Washington, is also the 17th largest employer in the Vancouver-Portland metropolitan area, according to **Joe Kortum**, who this month became president and CEO of the medical center.

Statistically, Southwest, which has 334 licensed beds, is among the busiest hospitals in both the metropolitan area and the state of Washington, Kortum told an audience of government, business and neighborhood leaders today.

Kortum was president and CEO of Northern Arizona Healthcare, Flagstaff, before being picked after a national search to succeed **Geoff Lang**, who retired last year.

Kortum said, however, the most surprising statistic of all is that so many thousands of Clark County people are dependent on Portland for hospital needs.

As many as 60,000 Clark County residents work in Oregon. Kortum said many of those are required by their Oregon health plans to use Oregon health care facilities. Others, he suggested, chose Portland health care because of the "aura" of Portland.

"We want the community to know what we have at Southwest Washington Medical Center," Kortum said; "our centers of excellence are state-of-the art."

Kortum was referring to the medical center's Cancer Center, Heart and Vascular Center and Rebound.

Kortum said he envisions the medical center's continuing to provide facilities for southwest Washington Kaiser Permanente members. He added that Southwest Washington Medical Center will cooperate with Legacy Health System's Salmon Creek Hospital.

"We will be partners with the community," Kortum declared.
