County takes hits in court

Clark County commissioners this week approved a series of court claims, the largest of which was \$700,000, to conclude a mediated settlement with **Kimberly Kennedy**.

A 13-year-old boy shot and killed Kennedy's husband and wounded her, after he had learned he had been named a suspect of molesting Kennedy's then nine-year-old daughter. A Ridgefield police officer had notified the suspect's mother of the allegation.

Commissioners authorized payment of \$50,000 to **John William Hager III**, who was attempting to elude pursuing police vehicles when a deputy sheriff's pistol accidentally discharged wounding him in the shoulder.

Commissioners agreed to pay **William G. Kraft** \$22,500 for his having been inadvertently kept in jail 12 days longer than his sentence called for.

Commissioners offered a judgment of \$17,500 to **Dino Vichas**, who claimed he had been falsely arrested in June 1999 for rendering criminal assistance to his son, by not having called the police as instructed when the son, wanted
