State doesn't score too well when it comes to competing for high-tech development; jobs

Results of Washington's Technology Alliance benchmarking project, comparing Washington against its peer states in three key areas of high-tech competitiveness suggest concern, but don't call for overreaction.

The Technology Alliance was formed in 1996 by **Bill** Gates Sr.

The alliance focused on three benchmarks. The alliance compared Washington to its eight high-tech peer states, California, Colorado, Georgia, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Texas and Virginia. The three benchmarks were: K through 12 and higher education, research capacity and entrepreneurial climate.

Washington's percentage of students graduating from high school within four years ranked 5th of the peer states and 32nd nationally. The state ranks 6th in the peer group and 26th nationally in the a mount of money invested per K-12 student.

The state's per capita percentage of students earning bachelors degrees was 6th among the peer group and 32nd nationally. The state ranked 29th nationally in the percentage of state residents earning advanced degrees in science or engineering. The state ranked in the bottom third of all states in higher education investment per student.

Washington ranked last among the peer states and 46th nationally in the amount that the state spends supporting research and development in its colleges and universities.

"In the worldwide race for a successful 21st-century economy an average performance just isn't good enough," says **Susan Malarkey**, executive director of the alliance.

"Washington cannot accept anything less than excellence if we are to compete successfully for our future."
