## Candlelight tour at the old fort expected to draw thousands tonight and tomorrow

The Fort Vancouver National Historic Site's most popular event of the year, the candlelight tour, which opens tonight from 7 to 10 p.m. and repeats from 7 to 10 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 13, is expected to draw over 6,000 visitors.

For one thing, there is no charge for the real-life comprehensive look at Vancouver's past. There is, however, a fee to visit the fort, which will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days. The fort is otherwise open seven days a week.

This year's candlelight tour expands far beyond the walls of the stockade-like fort, to areas outside the walls that in the 1820s to the 1840s had a population as high as 600 people, of a wide variety of nationalities.

The tour also offers an insight in to other stages of Vancouver history, with emphasis on agricultural, military and cultural aspects, within and beyond the walls of the fort.

More than 150 volunteers will be involved, most portraying historical periods as re-enactors.

Visitors will be able to see activities as they are believed to have actually existed. Bakers will be at work baking, blacksmiths will be making traps, accountants will be keeping books.
