## Vancouver's first full-time rabbi establishes local Jewish education and outreach center

Israeli-born **Shmuel Greenberg** and his wife, **Tzivia**, have established the Chabad Center for Jewish Education and Outreach in Vancouver, at 105 NE 106th Street.

Greenberg, 27, who received his rabbinic ordination from the Rabbinical Seminary, Brooklyn, N.W., is the first rabbi to assume full-time Jewish religious duties in Clark County. He has conducted Jewish outreach activities in New York, Ohio, Texas, and served as an intern rabbi of the Jewish community in Odessa, Ukraine.

Mrs. Greenberg, 25, received her teaching degree from Beth Rivka Teacher's College, Kfar Chabad, Israel. She has directed children's and students' programs in Italy, South Africa, Russia, Israel and in her home town, Morristown, N.J. Mrs. Greenberg is a scholar on the Jewish live-chat website, [askmoses.com](http://askmoses.com).

The Chabad Center will provide programs to facilitate the needs of local Jewish residents but will not provide regular religious services.

The first program will be "Rosh Hashana in the Park: A High Holiday Experience for the Whole Family," at 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 28, at the Salmon Creek Park.
