County commissioners expected to reduce travel speed standard on NE 134th Street

Clark County commissioners, during their regular meeting at 10 a.m. Tuesday, April 1, are expected to lower the concurrency travel speed on the NE 134th Street-Salmon Creek Avenue corridor from 22 miles an hour to as low as 13 miles an hour.

Commissioners will also consider whether to remove a development moratorium that has been in effect nearly a year and a half.

The decrease is necessary to allow for the impact of increased traffic expected with the completion of Legacy Salmon Creek Hospital at NE 139th Street and NE 20th Avenue. It is also a requirement of lifting a moratorium on development in the Salmon Creek area.

The corridor extends from the Interstate 5 interchange with NE 134th Street east to the intersection of Salmon Creek Avenue and NE 50th Avenue.
