# Proponents of a vote on downtown convention center withdraw appeal

The committee of petitioners seeking a vote on Vancouver's downtown convention center project has withdrawn its appeal of the final superior court decision denying a public vote.

Larry Patella, the leader of the group that twice circulated petitions calling for a public vote on the project, today announced that. "with concurrence of our committee of petitioners I have withdrawn our appeal of [Clark County Superior Court] judge Barbara Johnson's decision not to allow the issue of the special events center to be placed before the voters."

Patella said a serious illness in his family prevents him from devoting his energies to the cause.

Both times petitioners collected enough signatures on petitions to force a vote on the center, but both times the courts nevertheless ruled the petitions invalid.

Final design modifications are being made on the \$60 million plus hotel-convention center complex south of Esther Short Park, on which construction is expected to begin this summer.
