## I-5 widening to six lanes from NE 99th Street to I-205 subject of today's open house

An open house at 6 p.m. today in the Salmon Creek Elementary School cafeteria, 1601 NE 129th Street, will preview the \$34 million project to widen to six lanes Interstate 5 from NE 99th Street to Interstate 205.

The project, long on the books, is the first go out for bids since the legislature approved a five-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax to support \$4.17 billion in bonds for this and other transportation projects across the state over the next ten years.

Vancouver's Highway 500-Gher Road/112th Avenue project is also at the top of the state list for funding.

Both projects are expected to begin this summer, according to **Don Wagner**, state Department of Transportation administrator for southern Washington.

## Port of Kalama is number three on the west coast in bulk cargo

Primarily because of its grain shipments, the Port of Kalama is the third highest shipper of bulk cargo on the west coast, according to port manager **Lanny Cawley**.

Bulk cargo includes unpackaged shipments of such items as grain, coal and fertilizer.

The most recent figures produced by the Pacific Maritime Association put Port of Kalama shipments at 5,745,565 metric tons, below Portland's 8,993,185 metric tons and Long Beach, Calif., shipments of 7,250,539 metric tons.

The Port of Vancouver was sixth on the list with 4,861,091 metric tons.

The Port of Kalama ranks third in total tonnage in Washington, behind Tacoma and Seattle, and ahead of the Port of Vancouver.

Cawley says that 957 persons are employed in businesses located at the Port of Kalama.

## Smoke-free dining guide available from county health department

A guide to smoke-free restaurants in southwest Washington has been produced by Community Choices 2010 and the Tobacco Free Coalitions of Clark and Skamania Counties and is available from the internet or from the Clark County Health Department.

Department spokesperson **Theresa Cross** reports that the number of smoke-free restaurants has doubled in the past two years, to 69 percent of Clark County restaurants and 75 percent of Skamania County restaurants.

## Fourth of July Committee makes plea for support from fireworks buyers

**Jim Larson**, executive director of the Fourth of July Committee today made a plea to fireworks buyers to patronize the fireworks stands that support the annual display at the Fort Vancouver National Historic Reserve.

Fireworks sales are the largest single contributor to the

cost of the annual celebration. In recent years the income has been diluted by sales from private stands, according to Larson.

This year's display has been cut from 42 to 30 minutes, and entertainment drastically reduced, in an effort to put the event into the black and help pay back debts from last year.

Larson says those attending the celebration are each urged to make a donation of \$4 in a further effort to cover costs.

Supporting fireworks stands will be identified, he says.
