Fireworks sales begin Saturday, June 28

Fourth of July fireworks will be sold from 22 outlets inside the Vancouver city limits beginning at noon Saturday June 28, and ending at noon Sunday, July 6.

Fireworks stands designated by the official symbol to the left are those making contributions to the fireworks program and show. Other fireworks stands support other organizations. Fireworks are also sold from locations outside the city.

If Camp Bonneville isn't transferred to the county by Sept. 30, it could be mothballed

Unless Camp Bonneville is transferred to Clark County by Sept. 30, substantially less money will be available for cleanup, and the 3,840-acre former army camp could be mothballed, according to a report in a county newsletter this week.

County control before October this year is essential because U.S. Base Realignment and Closure Commission funding will be reduced sharply in 2004.

The BRAC selected Camp Bonneville as one of several facilities nationwide to be released in 1995. Clark County put together a local redevelopment authority. A local Restoration Advisory Board, with as many as 250 community members, developed multi-purpose plans for civilian use of the mostly forested former military training camp northeast of Vancouver. These ranged from parks and cultural centers to firing ranges and RV camping.

But, as assessments were made of the condition of the facility, the costs of removing unexploded ordnance and other hazardous contaminants grew into the millions—far more than the county could afford.

An agreement with the Army that the cleanup would be federally funded gave renewed hope that the camp would become a local multi-purpose landmark.

Negotiations with the Army and BRAC stalled, however, and other governmental agencies put in bids.

Regardless, the camp must be rendered harmless, and that can't be done without money.

The county has scheduled a community meeting for 7 p.m. Wednesday, July 30, in the Dollars Corner Fire Station, 21609 NE 72nd Avenue. Clark County staff, the state Department of Ecology and representatives of the Army are expected to attend.
