## Fire Department's first two-man emergency medical service vehicle on the job

The first of three two-person emergency medical service vehicles has been put into service by the Vancouver Fire Department at the McLoughlin Heights Fire Station 84 at Devine Road and Mill Plain Boulevard.

The new EMS vehicle, which also can be used to transport patients to a hospital in an emergency, is smaller and lighter than the fire engines and fire trucks, which carry crews of three or four.

Fire chief **Don Biven's** business plan for the department calls for two more light-duty EMS vehicles. They are less costly to operate and are expected to help improve emergency response times. About 80 percent of fire calls are for emergency medical service.

On board are advanced lifesaving equipment for advanced cardiac and trauma life support, including defibrillators and intravenous and intubation equipment.
