## Week-long filing period for local elective offices began today; contests shaping up

The week-long filing period for local elective offices began today, and primary contests are beginning so shape up.

Gregg Kimsey's county auditor's office is making it easy for election watchers to keep up; a website is being updated as candidates file. The website address is **elections.clark.wa.gov**.

In Camas, **Paul Dennis** filed his candidacy for mayor and, shortly afterward, Mayor **Dean Dossett** also filed. **David Gast** and **Liz Pike Erikson**, each filed for the position of councilmember-at-large in Camas.

In Vancouver, three persons have filed for the council position held by **Jeanne Lipton**. Two who already had announced their intentions are **Larry J. Smith** and **Mike Teefey**. **Julie K. Young** also filed for that position today.

Yacolt mayor **Jim Robertson** filed his candidacy for reelection. **Thomas Holyk** also filed for that position. There are two candidates for Yacolt council position 4: **Laura Lee Van Tassell** and **Ronnie Stewart**.

Two candidates filed for District 2 position on the Camas-Washougal Port District board of directors. They are **Jim Gray** and **Rich Gunderson**.

The first person to file today was **Sam Kim**, Brush Prairie, who filed to retain his seat on the Battle Ground School District board.

Primary election day is Tuesday, Sept. 16, in what will be an all-mail primary election.

### Heat prompts free C-TRAN bus rides; need to be careful of animal health

The summer heat, at least for today and Tuesday, has triggered Clear Air Action days in Clark County, one of the results of which is that C-TRAN bus service is free today and all day Tuesday.

Bus riders make a significantly positive impact on air quality by making the alternate commute choice, says C-TRAN Executive Director/CEO **Lynne Griffith**.

According to Griffith bus ridership goes up about 20 percent during free fare days.

On exceptionally hot days, the Southwest Washington Humane Society receives hundreds of complaints concerning dogs left unattended in hot cars or left outdoors in extreme heat.

Since cats and dogs have no sweat glands, even a short time in a hot environment is life threatening, reports humane society director **Rick Collord**. Animals should not be left inside cars during hot days even if the windows are open. He says. Weather reporters are loathe to say when the hot spell will wane.
