# Hamilton Construction, Springfield gets first nickel funding project in Washington

The first Washington state highway project to be funded by the state's new 5-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax has been awarded to Hamilton Construction, Springfield, Ore.

The nearly \$26 million project, to widen Interstate 5 from NE 99th Street to I-205, begins later this month or early in August, according to **Don Owings**, area engineer for the state Department of Transportation.

One new travel lane and one new auxiliary lane will be added to each side of the highway. The auxiliary lanes will allow motorists to more easily enter and exit the freeway to and from the exchanges at NE 99th Street and NE 134th Street, Owings says.
