Rare, original copy of Declaration of Independence coming soon to cities near you

The City of Portland, the City of Vancouver and 24 other cities across the United States will host a rare, original copy of the Declaration of Independence as part of a three-year cross-country tour by the Declaration of Independence Road Trip.

The Road Trip is sponsored by a non-profit, nonpartisan project founded by television and movie producer **Norman Lear** with the goal of bringing the "People's Document" directly to Americans.

The Declaration of Independence will be on display in Vancouver on Tuesday, September 23, 7 p.m. at the Water Resources Education Center, along with a related program. The document will also be on display in Portland at the Oregon Historical Society from September 22, 2003 to September 28, 2003. Entrance to the display is free. Hours are Mon.-Sat., 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sun., noon to 5 p.m.

On the night of July 4, 1776, about 200 copies of the newly drafted and approved Declaration of Independence were printed by John Dunlap of Philadelphia. Of the 25 surviving copies of the Dunlap broadside, 21 copies belong to universities, historical societies, libraries and city halls. The remaining four are in private hands, although promised to public collections. The Declaration of Independence on display at the Water Resources Education Center and the Oregon Historical Society will be the only copy known to be traveling across the country.
