# Southwest Washington federal law enforcement center to open Monday

U.S. Rep. **Brian Baird** (D-3rd) will help open the new Federal Investigative Center at 500 W 12th Street at 1:30 p.m. Monday, Nov. 10.

Baird lead an effort to incorporate federal agents in a single office in Vancouver.

The center will be staffed by agents from the U.S. Marshals Service, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, Bureau of Immigration and Customs Enforcement, Drug Enforcement Administration, U.S. Secret Service, and the U.S. Postal Inspection Service.

Until the Vancouver center is opened Tacoma is the closest federal center serving southern Washington.

Federal Bureau of Investigation and Internal Revenue Services also have offices in Vancouver.

Nor will any of the races be close enough—within one-half of one percent—to trigger a recount, Likness says.
