First Independent Mortgage gets \$50 million loan from First Independent for expansion

Operation Green Lights taking off

Vancouver's Shell Solar Industries has become Clark Public Utilities' largest business partner in its Green Lights program, which promotes the development and use of renewable electric energy.

Shell Solar has agreed to buy 1,210 blocks of Green Lights power, which represents about 1.5 million kilowatt hours a year. The agreement follows a purchase earlier this month of 70 blocks of Green Power made by Sharp Microelectronics of the Americas, Camas.

Curtis. "The commitment of large energy users helps encourage other customers to join the program, which will result in development of additional renewable energy resources in the Pacific Northwest."

Green Lights is a voluntary program offering 100 kilowatt-hour blocks of electricity for \$1.50 each.

The contributions are pooled through the Bonneville Environmental Foundation, which is developing renewable energy projects in the region.

Since the program began last year, 245 Clark Public Utilities customers have bought 3,417 blocks of Green Lights power. For further information, call 992-3238.
