Brett Rogers named associate director of state small business development group

Brett Rogers, who for the past two and a half years has been director of business expansion and retention for the Columbia River Economic Development Council, has been named associate director of the Washington Small Business Development Center, headquartered in Spokane.

Prior to joining CREDC,

Transportation expert prescribes regional financial planning for I-5 choke-point cure

"Now is the time for the region [Washington and Oregon] to find ways to finance transportation improvements at the I-5 choke-point [the Columbia River]," **Lance Grenzeback**, author of a study detailing economic effects of declining Interstate 5 corridor freight mobility, told a Vancouver audience this morning.

The alternative is to be prepared for increased congestion and increased economic costs, Grenzeback stated.

"Congestion at the Columbia River crossings is not just a local problem, it is a Pacific Northwest Problem," according to Grenzeback. "The region's economy is built on transportation-intensive industries. As a consequence, the Washington-Oregon economy is more dependent on transportation and spends more proportionally on transportation than the nation as a whole."

Grenzeback said that the region has an efficient transportation system today, but if the region loses reliable and cost-effective access to its businesses, farms, ports, airports and trade partners, the regional economy loses.

Without action, he continued, the duration of peakperiod congestion at the Interstate Bridge will double from four hours today to nearly 10 hours in 2020. The congestion will spread into the midday period, delaying commercial traffic by 140 percent.

The rail network within the Vancouver-Portland area is equally congested, he said. "Rail congestion adds about 40 minutes to every train move, twice the delay in Chicago, the nation's largest rail hub."

The study Grenzeback conducted for the Oregon State Department of Transportation did not suggest specific

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fixes for local congestion, but it did allude to the proposals already made by the bi-state I-5 Trade and Transportation Partnership.

These include rail as well as such highway improvements as additional highway lanes and light rail access across a new or expanded I-5 crossing at the existing location.
