Columbia Credit Union to expand to downtown Murdock Building

Columbia Credit Union will occupy 20,000 square feet on two floors of the Murdock Building, 703 Broadway, this fall, according to **David Doss**, president and chief executive officer of the 57,000-member financial institution.

The move, expected to be completed in November, will see the credit union's downtown branch moved to the first floor of the Murdock Building. In addition, about 40 administrative and business banking employees from the credit union's east

Vancouver headquarters will move into the fifth floor.

Doss says service will be enhanced by adding business, mortgage and personal trust services at the downtown facility. In addition to free parking, there will be a drive-up ATM.

Founded in 1952, Columbia Credit Union has \$600 million in assets and is southern Washington's largest credit union and is the second largest financial institution in Clark County. It has 11 branches.

Commissioners and planners holding final joint session on land-use alternatives today

Clark County commissioners and the county Planning Commission are holding their final joint meeting to discuss five alternative proposals for updating the county growth management plan at 6:30 p.m. today in the Public Service Center, 1300 Franklin Street.

How land-use planning will affect development of family-wage jobs is the focus of the current debate.

Today's work session will be followed by a public hearing conducted by the commissioners at 10 a.m. Monday, June 22, in the Public Service Center. Adoption of a final amended growth management plan is expected by the end of the year.
