Clark College Foundation search for president narrowed to two

From a nationwide group of 80 applicants who would like to succeed **Elson Strahan** as president of the Clark College Foundation, a foundation search committee has selected two finalists.

They are **Cassie McVeety**, director of campus advancement at Washington State University Vancouver, and **Kimberly Pittman-Schultz**, president and chief executive officer of the Williamsport-Lycoming Foundation, Williamsport, Pa.

Private meetings with the finalists are scheduled for next week.

Strahan, who had been president and CEO of the foundation for 19 years, left earlier this year to become president of the Fort Vancouver Historic Reserve Trust.

During his tenure, the foundation went from being a small community college foundation to become the largest of its kind in the world. Today, the foundation has assets of over \$50.3 million.

Utility crew blows fuse, Clark Public Utilities covers cost of lost production for Frito Lay

Clark Public Utilities' crews accidentally tripped a fuse while upgrading power feeds to the Fruit Valley Frito Lay plant May 20. Power from a large compressor at the plant was off for three minutes, and this forced the plant to shut down for six hours.

This week utility commissioners, approved a \$19,000 payment to Frito Lay to cover the cost of lost production, chips and ingredients.

Commented Clark's director of engineering, **Larry Bekkedahl**, the utility compensates customers for losses when its employees cause a power failure.
