Ed Firstenburg's resume goes back 90 years



Ed Firstenburg gets new job; heads up Waterford branch

For 67 years First Independent Bank has been **Ed Firstenburg**'s bank. Until retiring recently he was owner, president, CEO and chairman of the board.

While First Independent is the largest privately owned banking institution in Clark County, its recently opened Waterford branch, is the smallest of the bank's

23 southern Washington branches. Firstenburg now heads that little branch.

Firstenburg and his wife, **Mary**, live at the Waterford at Fairway Village. Five days a week the "soft spoken, charming" Firstenburg goes downstairs to the branch and between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. plies his trade—lending, keeping money and valuables safe, and offering advice.

Firstenburg was born and reared in Seattle, where he first went into business. From the age of 3 1/2 to 7, he says, he sold daily copies of the *Seattle Times*.

The Times sold for two cents a copy, according to Firstenburg: "We had to pay the company one cent for each copy we thought we could sell. There were no returns. We had to be very careful in estimating."
