County Planning Commission to hear proposed changes in rural business code

Clark County's proposed ordinance to regulate homebased businesses in all parts of unincorporated Clark County will be reviewed by the county Planning Commission at a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 21, in Clark Public Utilities' community room, 8600 NE 117th Avenue.

The draft ordinance, which would revise a current home occupation, was developed by a citizens task force appointed by the county commissioners.

Overall, the proposed standards for rural areas are less stringent than current standards. For urban areas, the proposed ordinance reflects much of the County Code currently in place.

Under the proposed ordinance, no permit would be required for businesses operated entirely within a residence by the person living there who has no employees.

On lots 10,000 square feet or larger, resident business owners could apply for permits to have up to three employees.
