135th Clark County fair opens with free breakfast; Grant Funk Railroad headlines

The 135th running of the Clark County Fair opens tomorrow with its traditional 8-to-11 a.m. free breakfast and free fair admission—with a coupon from participating Fred Meyer stores.

The **Grand Funk Railroad** concert at the main stage tops off the first day with traditional All-American tunes as well as so-far unrecorded numbers, recent hits and a five-minute drum solo.

The fair runs for ten days, opening other days at 10 a.m. and closing at 11 p.m. except on Sundays, when closing is at 10 p.m.

Newest offering is an Oregon Museum of Science and Industry exhibit, in what fair manager **Tom Musser** calls the scientific playhouse.

Coupons for the free breakfast are available at participating Fred Meyer stores from Tillamook to Longview. Last year, more than 20,000 fair goers showed up for the breakfast.

Without coupons adult fair admission is \$8. Fair admission includes grandstand seating at the *Columbian* Main Stage for all shows and concerts. Reserved admission on the grass in front of the grandstand varies according to each show but includes free fair admission.

Reserved seats for Grand Funk Railroad are \$15.

Parking, however, is not free and this year has increased to \$5 per vehicle.

C-TRAN bus service to the fair from the following locations: 7th Street Transit Center, Fisher's Landing Transit Center, Vancouver Mall Transit Center (SE lot near JC Penney), Battle Ground Park & Ride, and Salmon Creek Park & Ride, is nearly free—50 cents per adult. The return trip is free.

Todd Reeves appointed superintendent of the State School for the Deaf

The filing period ends at 5 p.m. Friday, Aug. 1.

Tom Griffith, director, Clark Regional Emergency Services Agency, has been selected to join a Department of Homeland Security work group to help draft the department's National Response Plan and the National Incident Management System.
