City council votes 5-2 to proceed with hotel-convention center

The Vancouver City Council last night voted 5-2 to proceed with a planned \$71.2 million hotel and conference center. Downtown Vancouver is awakening from its slumbers, said Mayor **Royce Pollard**.

Opposing the measure, as they have throughout the several years the project has been on the table, were councilmembers **Jeanne Lipton** and **Jeanne Stewart.**

Lipton is a candidate in this year's general election for Pollard's office.

Lipton and Stewart regard the proposed convention center project as poorly financed and as not having been presented to the public for a vote.

But the prospect of some kind of downtown center has already brought life back to the Esther Short Park area. Apartments and condominium buildings face the east and north boundaries of the park, and a third set of apartments is nearly under construction on the west side.

The hotel, with a conference center inside, would be built on the south side of the park.

Although the council by its vote has given the green light, a few other elements are yet to be resolved. They include a lawsuit filed recently in Olympia protesting the state law tat provides a sales tax rebate for communities which build public facilities (several in the state do) and an agreement with Hilton Hotels to operate the 225-room hotel and its 30,000 square foot convention facility once it is built, and whether or how much of the county's sales tax rebate would go toward the Vancouver center.

Unemployment lessens in Clark County

Although well above state and national unemployment statistics, Clark County continued to improve. Non-adjusted unemployment stood at 8.9 percent of the labor force here in September, compared to 9.1 percent recorded in August and 10.1 percent in July.

Statewide, non-adjusted unemployment stood at 7.0 percent, down .2 percent from August. Nationally, unemployment for September was 5.8 percent.

The best that state Employment Security Department chief **Sylvia Mundy** could say today was that "the labor market is not getting significantly worse."

Clark Public Utilities communicates a lot

Clark Public Utilities has been named Mailer of the Year by the Greater Portland Postal Customer Council for management excellence. Receiving the award for the utility, which includes \$100 for a celebration party, was **Rose Wiley**, the utility's office services manager.

The utility handles more than 4.5 million pieces of incoming and outgoing mail a year.

But, also, the utility handles 455,325 telephone calls annually. Customers each talk to the utility an average of 2 minutes and 19 seconds for a total of 17,600 hours a year.

Utility commissioners Tuesday approved a staff recommendation for a call monitoring system, "in an effort to further improve customer communications."
