Library district, hit by declining income, increased costs, cuts budget, reduces staff

Decreased tax revenue and increased costs forced the Fort Vancouver Regional Library board of trustees to reduce the library district's 2003 budget by nearly 8 percent to \$14,855,133, and lay off six of the library's staff.

The decreases, made by the board during its Monday meeting, are not expected to have a significant public service impact, reports library executive director **Bruce Ziegman**.

"We looked carefully at trimming costs in areas that would minimally affect the ability to provide great library service, which is the district's primary mission and top priority," Ziegman said.

The staff positions eliminated were mainly in administration, according to Ziegman. Other spending adjustments will come in book purchasing, outside professional services, travel, training and capital purchases.

The new budget reflects a decline in tax revenue, including a decrease of \$274,000 in state timber harvest receipts.

Higher expenditures are the result of staffing at the "wildly successful" new Three Creeks Library, and significant increases in insurance and health benefit costs.

It was the first time in 20 years that the library has had to adjust its operating costs downward. The library district serves 382,905 southwest Washington citizens through 12 community libraries in Clark, Klickitat and Skamania Counties.

BPA looking for ways to blunt increase

When Bonneville Power Administration begins its field hearings tomorrow in Portland to lay out its case for an October rate increase, it may find a way to make the increase more acceptable to customers—either less than the expected 15 percent, or by not locking in on a fixes rate over a three-year period.

For starters, the snow pack has improved by ten percentage points from 75 percent of normal to 85 percent of normal during what BPA calls the Miracle of March.

But BPA is also looking as suggesting a rate increase Wednesday that would not be locked in until all the variables have been considered up to the time the increase becomes effective on Oct. 1, 2003.

Current conditions suggest that BPA will have a \$1.2 billion shortfall in 2006. BPA customers, including Clark Public Utilities, hope BPA will not try to make up for a long-term potential shortfall with a short-term fix.
