### Legacy Health System to break ground on Salmon Creek Hospital tomorrow

Legacy Health System will break ground at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 21, on its 222-bed acute care Salmon Creek Hospital and medical complex at the southeast corner of NE 139th Street and NE 20th Avenue.

Construction begins with a seven-level parking structure and a medical office complex. The hospital is scheduled to open in mid-2005, according to hospital administrator **Joe Kunkel**.

Legacy has agreed to over \$4 million in road and highway improvements in order to proceed with construction.

### State unemployment numbers up again

Washington's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose two-tenths of a percent to 7.3 percent in April, according to the state Employment Security Department.

Nationally, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate also rose two-tenths of a percent, to 6 percent.

Clark County's unadjusted unemployment rate for April climbed to 9.9 percent. It stood at 9.5 in March.

## Washington State University Vancouver master plan review begins Thursday

The less than ten-year-old Washington State University Vancouver \$100 million, 351-acre campus at Salmon Creek is already home to the equivalent of 1,260 full-time students—and is growing rapidly.

The number of full-time-equivalent students is expected to grow to nearly 2,000 in five years, and to nearly 3,000 in ten years.

The university, which is updating its master plan, will be holding two open houses Thursday, May 22, to explain its plans and draw input from its neighbors and the community.

The sessions, at 3:30 p.m. and 7 p.m., are in the Student Services Building.

Meanwhile, construction continues apace. The Clark College Center, valued at \$19.5 million, will be completed in 2005. It will add 63,000-square feet, including classrooms, teaching laboratories and faculty offices.

Design work has begun on the Student Services Center Complex. The building will add another 30,000 square feet to the campus and is expected to cost \$12.2 million. It, too, could be completed in 2005, depending on state capital funding. The center would accommodate a visitor's center, admissions, student services operations and a new student bookstore. The current bookstore will be converted to multi-use meeting and office space.

Future planning calls for a 70,000-square-foot Business/Education Building that would cost \$33 million and would be completed in late 2008, again depending on state funding.

The university currently is studying potential environmental impacts such as traffic and water.
