Legislators returning to Olympia in hopes of closing out the session with budget approval

State senators and representatives return to Olympia tomorrow to act on the state's biennial budget bills, which have been prepared by a cadre of legislators working in the capital since the end of the regular session.

Sen. **Joe Zarelli** (R-18th) and Rep. **Bill Fromhold** (D-49th), the two southern Washington legislators who have developed the packages the full legislature will tackle, have done a good job, according to Sen. **Don Carlson** (R-49th).

Carlson says \$2.7 million for expansion of the blended engineering technology institute program at Washington State University Vancouver is included in the proposed budget, as is \$6 million to cover costs of 400 community college transfer students to four-year institutions, and \$6 to provide for costs of 500 students who will be seeking education in high demand job programs.

According to Carlson, the WSU Vancouver program is in concert with Clark and Lower Columbia Community Colleges. It will provide that students may enroll jointly in a community college and WSU Vancouver to pursue a four-year course leading to a bachelor's degree, the first two years in a community college, the final two at WSU Vancouver.

\$21 million Gher Road/NE 112th Avenue interchange on Highway 500 goes to bid

The state Department of Transportation issued a call for bids today for construction of the Gher Road/NE 112th Avenue interchange on Highway 500 today.

The \$21 million project is the second in the state to go out for bid as a result of the state legislature's recently passed five-cent a gallon gasoline tax to provide for transportation projects throughout the state.

The first project, a \$32 million widening of I-5 north of NE 99th Street to I-205, has already been advertised.

Construction on the Highway 500 interchange is to begin this summer, as is the I-5 project.
