Commissioners hear results of Clark Public Utilities' Columbia Springs partnership

When the state of Washington was putting the venerable Vancouver Fish Hatchery at 12208 SE Evergreen Highway on the auction block in 1997, Clark Public Utilities, feeling a need to maintain environmental partnerships, stepped in with a plan, and \$275,000 in cash, to save the historic hatchery and its 44 bucolic acres in Vancouver's high-rent district.

Today, the hatchery property, now known as the Columbia Springs Environmental Education Center, is producing again—trout and steelhead, valued at a million dollars a year—and is a magnet for environmental studies at both the K-12 and college levels. During the past year nearly 8,000 students pursued in-class and laboratory studies in the center. Columbia Springs Environmental Education Center has expanded to 156 acres of trails, creeks and springs, fauna and flora.

The center has grown to have its own corporate board of directors and has a full-time executive director, **Jan Van Dyke**, who was a utility district commissioner when the center was first envisioned.

While the center's budget has grown to \$648,000, Clark Public Utilities is still the primary source of support (331,000 this year), although the partnership that began between the utility and the department of fisheries has grown to include Vancouver, Clark College, the Clark College Foundation, the Evergreen School District, Columbia Springs, and Columbia Springs Environmental Education Center Foundation.

The utility commissioners, revisiting their participation in community programs, today heard one of their managers, **Dean Sutherland**, who is also a member of the center's board and president of the center's foundation board, outline a possible new partnership in which the environmental center would be the focus.

Today's workshop is preliminary to the utility's developing its 2004 budget.

Sutherland, who was the utility's point person in developing the original partnership, conducted today's review.

"Clark is involved because the center complements our utility work, is a reinvestment in our community, demonstrates our commitment to the environment, provides local recreational opportunities for our customers and has saved a valuable community asset," Sutherland stated.

The decision to form the initial partnership came at the time when the utility diversified its power supply, generating half its power from its natural gas turbine and buying the remainder on the open market. When the utility bought power from Bonneville Power Administration, BPA earmarked hundreds of thousands of dollars from the utility's bill for fish restoration.

The utility viewed saving the fish hatchery as an opportunity to maintain its environmental commitment, according to Sutherland.

The center is open to visitors between 7:30 a.m. and
