Demolition signals start of Southwest Washington Medical Center expansion

Southwest Washington Medical Center president and CEO **Joe Kortum**, at the controls of a behemoth Samsung back hoe this morning, took the first bite out of the former Dick Hannah Chrysler Dealership just north of Mill Plain Boulevard, signaling the beginning of the medical center's \$120 million expansion program

Behind the 2.5-acre property south of the medical center an eight-story tower will rise, housing new surgical suites and new one-patient rooms that eventually will replace all multi-beds in the center.

Southwest Washington Medical Center has the busiest emergency department in four states. The medical center is the third largest health care facility in the Vancouver-Portland metropolitan area, according to Kortum.

"It's the epicenter of health care in southern Washington," the chief says.

The state Department of Health gave the 360-bed non-profit institution authorization to expand by 82 new beds at the same time last year when it granted Legacy Health System permission to build a 220-bed hospital in Salmon Creek.

Site preparation is already underway on Legacy's hospital, although details of who will pay for all traffic improvements have not been ironed out.

Kortum says Southwest Washington Medical Center's expansion and modernization is a work in progress.

Construction is expected to begin next spring. Kortum. says that final design will follow form as planners try to keep up with advancing medical technology.

The most complicated technological advances are in medical communications—how patient records are handled. There are significant advances in surgical robotics that we have to consider. The most important thing, though, Kortum says, is maintaining the highest level of patient care during construction.

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MBJ Architects, Seattle, are developing the physical plans requested by the medical center.

Natural gas prices expected to cost average residential customer \$7.62 more a month

NW Natural has asked the state Utilities and Transportation Commission permission to increase retail natural gas prices by 16.3 percent for residential customers, by 17.6 percent for commercial customers and by approximately 21 percent for industrial .

The increases, adding \$7.62 cents to the average residential customers monthly bill, would take effect on October 1.

The company, which files for rate adjustments annually based on wholesale gas costs, passes those costs directly through to customers with no markup. NW Natural's profit is derived from its transportation of natural gas to the customer.
