Foot bridge 300 feet long, 40 feet wide to connect Fort Vancouver to its waterfront

Three designs by famed artist/architect **Maya Lin** for a 300-foot long, 40-foot wide foot bridge crossing over the Lewis and Clark Highway (Highway 14) and the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad between Fort Vancouver Historic Reserve on the north and somewhere near Apple Tree Park on the south will be disclosed in a public ceremony inside the fort at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 24.

There won't be a charge to get inside the fort, but **Jane Jacobsen** executive director of the Confluence Project suggests a \$25 donation to the project instead.

Cost of the bridge is about \$6 million. Some of the funding is available from the state Department of Transportation and grants. The remainder is being sought by the Confluence Project.

Lin, who designed, among other things, the Vietnam War Veterans Wall in Washington, D.C., won't be attending the unveiling of her ideas, but noted Seattle architect **Johnpaul Jones**, from Jones+Jones, will.

Jones, of American Indian heritage, and designer of the National Museum of the American Indian in Washington. D.C., is working with Lin to engineer the span.

One of the three designs will be depicted as a scale model. The other two will be shown in drawings.

Lin has been commissioned to produce several Confluence projects along the Columbia River. In addition to the bridge in Vancouver, she is working on a piece of art for Frenchman's Bar in Clark County, and commemorative works in Clarkston, Fort Canby State Park and Sacajawea State Park, as part of Washington's Lewis and Clark Commemorative legacy.

The Vancouver bridge is to be completed in 2005, for the 200th anniversary of the arrival in Washington of Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery.

County's rate of growth still above 2 percent

Clark County's residential growth rate is nearly exactly at the 2 percent annual rate predicted by Clark Public Utilities last fall.

As of August 31, the electric utility had connected 2,016 new residential customers, showing an annual growth rate of 2.03 percent for 2003.

The rate of growth north of Vancouver in the Hazel Dell, Salmon Creek areas is 3.34 percent, judging from the number of new residential water connections, the utility's finance director, **Rick Dyer**, said today. The water district has added 589 new residential customers since January.

Recreational ban on burning lifted

It's all right to have recreational fires in backyard fireplaces and appliances or in fire pits no larger that three feet in diameter, the Clark County Fire Marshall's office reports.

A ban on outdoor burning, including campfires in approved locations, had been in effect since early summer because of the dry conditions.
