County population growth still climbing

Clark County population has grown by about 10,000 persons since January, according to new electrical hook ups recorded by Clark Public Utilities.

While growth was under 2 percent for most of the year, the annual rate of growth of residential customers increased to 2.58 percent at the end of October.

So far this year, the utility has signed up 3,232 new residential households—1,216 in September and October alone
