Vancouver's legislative agenda would include enhanced revenue flexibility

The draft of Vancouver's 2004 state legislative agenda, to be presented to the City Council on Monday, Dec. 15, will focus on enhancing municipal revenue flexibility and optimizing existing municipal resources.

The draft being circulated for comment and refinement by Vancouver's governmental relations **Mark O. Brown** also calls for a number of other changes in state law that would give cities greater local control.

Brown calls for support of legislation that would provide cities with a meaningful tax increment financing tool to be used in association with economic development and redevelopment.

The draft calls for support of legislation that would provide additional counties, including Clark County, with comparable authority as was granted to central Puget Sound counties, and would provide, as a local option, the creation of regional transportation authorities.

Also recommended is support for an increase in direct distribution of state gasoline tax revenues to cities.

Brown calls for support for legislation to provide cities with authority to use up to 25 percent of Real Estate Excise Tax local funding for maintenance and operation of facilities obtained through REET funding.

The report also calls for support of legislation that would streamline the annexation process for property within city urban growth boundaries.

Brown calls for support for legislation sought by the state Association of Fire Chiefs to provide local jurisdictions with a local option of creating regional fire authorities.

Admission is free for the annual Christmas at Fort Vancouver, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 13.

Living history will be re-enacted throughout the day, according to National Park Service spokesperson **Greg Shine**.

Highlight of re-enactments will be "Hunting on Christmas Day," a program involving black-powder muskets, based on a journal account by Thomas Lowe, written on Dec. 25, 1845.

Fort Vancouver is considered the birthplace of Euro-American civilization in the history of the Pacific Northwest. It includes the site of the Hudson's Bay fort, agricultural fields, the village and waterfront of the Hudson's Bay Company, and includes sections of Vancouver Barracks, and the army post parade ground. It was established as a unit of the National Park System in 1948.
