Chamber participants in insurance program get \$300,001 bonanza

A small group of Greater Vancouver Chamber of Commerce members who participate in a risk-management group are sharing a \$300,001 insurance premium rebate from the state Department of Labor and Industries.

The rebate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002, averages nearly \$12,000 for each of the 26 participants, according to the chamber's Retrospective Rating Manufacturing Group administrator **Scott Croucher**. The rebate represents a 63 percent reduction in workers' compensation premiums that the group paid to the state.

Croucher, a Vancouver risk-management consultant, teamed up with the chamber in 1998 to take advantage of a state law that allows manufacturers who belong to an organization, such as the chamber, to join in an incentive program rewarding employers who effectively minimize workers' compensation claims.

Only members of the local chamber are eligible to participate. According to Croucher, there are some 400 local manufacturers who are potential members of the group.

Croucher says the annual refunds are not always this large. In the first year the group saw a 16 percent refund of insurance premiums, and a 27 percent refund the second year. Last year, Croucher says, the group broke even.

Clark County development activity nearly as strong as the same time last year

Clark County development activity showed mixed results in the first quarter of 2003, reports **Richard Carson**, Department of Community Development director.

During the first three months of this year the county issued 1,455 building permits, of which 530 were for single family homes, compared to 1,539 total permits, of which 594 were for single family homes, in the first quarter of 2002.

The total value of residential construction for both periods was the same: \$73 million. The total value of commercial permits issued in the first quarter this year was \$13 million, based on 93 building permits, compared to \$20 million based on 107 building permits in the first quarter 2002.

The first-quarter figures this year reflect factors other than the economy, according to Carson. He said many developers submitted construction applications early in the first quarter a year ago to avoid fee increases. In 2003, fee increases were less of an issue, and the department was closed to permit applications for a week to accommodate the move of his department to the Public Service Building.

Federal funding for streets to be celebrated

U.S. Sen. **Patty Murray** (D-Wash.) will join local leaders and activists at a news conference at 5:15 p.m. Thursday, April 24, to celebrate nearly \$9 million in

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federal funds earmarked for three community highway projects.

The news conference will be at the Fred Meyer parking lot at the corner of Mill Plain Boulevard and Chkalov Road, near where a Mill Plain-I-205 off ramp will be built, partially financed by a \$3 million federal allocation.

The transportation package for Clark County also includes \$3 for improvements for upgrading and expanding SW First and NW Lake Roads in Camas, and \$2.6 million for C-TRAN improvements.

Open house will show off city block grant projects

An open house from 5 to 7 p.m. today in Vancouver's Esther Short Building, 610 Esther Street, will showcase community development block grant-funded projects.

This year's 16 community block grants, ranging in size from \$10,000 to \$325,000, were financed through an appropriation of \$1.35 million.

The federally funded grants are administered by the city through recognized city neighborhood associations.
