Governor signing the semiconductor tax incentive bill in Camas Thursday

Gov. **Gary Locke** Thursday will sign Senate Bill 5725, which gives a variety of tax incentives to the semiconductor industry, at 1 p.m. Thursday, May 8, in WaferTech, 5509 NW Parker Street, Camas.

WaferTech's Camas operation is the largest semiconductor foundry in Washington and one of the largest in the world.

State Sen. **Joe Zarelli** (R-18th) a sponsor of the bill, says the legislation will help bring roughly \$250 million in new revenue to the state and will protect 3,000 jobs statewide.

Although the measure has been touted as a way of enticing WaferTech to build a new \$3.5 billion plant, in Clark County, the company has not revealed any future building plans. However, WaferTech has been hiring some production workers lately.
