Locke calls special session to get tax incentive package ready for Boeing bid

Gov. **Gary Locke** called the legislature into special session this morning after the first special session, which ended at midnight, failed to resolve tax incentive issues on the state's bid to get Boeing's 7E7 business.

The state submits its bid to the aerospace giant June 20. Locke commended the legislature for what it has done so far, but says the legislature must act on the tax incentive package for the aerospace industry and on unemployment insurance and injured workers' compensation reform.

The Quincunx brass will discuss provisions for sound and traffic control, security, the complaint process in the public meeting, and, according to neighborhood association president **Bridget Schwarz**, "will answer as many questions as time permits."

It has taken more than five years to reach this point. Negotiations between Quincunx's predecessor and Clark County began in 1998. The county was looking for ways to make money on the fairgrounds property. An amphitheater seemed a natural.

The agreement worked out will give the county the 18,000-seat amphitheater and, on average, \$1 million in new revenue a year over the next 20 years.

The first concert, **John Mayer and Counting Crows**, is 8 p.m. Thursday, July 10, followed by **Jackson Browne**, **Steve Earle and Keb Mo** on Monday, July 21.
