Kimsey said he was pleased that the program is improving monitoring processes and is developing outcome-based performance measures. But he concluded, "Unfortunately, we found that while operational data is collected, program managers have not been able to present this in a manner which demonstrates the results of their work, and a formal capital facilities plan has not been adopted."
