## Washington State University Vancouver innovation smoothes student transfers

An initiative by Washington State University Vancouver chancellor **Hal Dengerink**, fully supported by WSU's president **W. Lane Rawlins**, signals a new era in student transferability from community colleges to upper division institutions.

Thus far the new co-admissions program, announced yesterday at a news conference by Dengerink and acting Clark College president **David Beyer**, is effective between WSU Vancouver and Clark and Lower Columbia Community Colleges.

Local students may apply for admission to both Clark and WSU Vancouver, and provided they maintain WSU Vancouver requirements they are guaranteed admission to WSU Vancouver.

"That's a significant guarantee," said Beyer. "Upper division schools are beginning to cut off transfer students."

According to Dengerink, students will pay Clark tuition rates for Clark classes and WSU Vancouver rates for upper division classes. In some cases, Clark students will actually take classes at WSU Vancouver.

"We want to assure qualified students' transferability," Dengerink said.

## Gasoline and motor vehicle use increased effective Tuesday, July 1

Washington's newly adopted 5-cent gasoline tax becomes effective Tuesday, July 1.

Motor vehicle buyers and sellers will also discover next Tuesday that the .3 percent use tax (sales tax increase) also becomes effective.

That tax will add \$60 to the purchase of a new or used \$20,000 vehicle.

The state tax on gasoline and diesel becomes 23 cents and 28 cents respectively.

Including federal taxes, the tax on a gallon of gasoline sold in Washington will be 46.4 cents. The tax on diesel fuel will become 52.4 cents.

## Vancouver gets federal COPS grant; can hire 15 new police officers

The City of Vancouver has been awarded a \$1.125 million federal Community Oriented Policing Services grant which will allow it to hire 15 new police officers, U.S. Rep. **Brian Baird** (D-3rd) announced today.

Vancouver police chief **Brian Martinek** said the grant is critical to Vancouver's being able to address homeland security requirements and to put more officers on the streets.
