# VHA gets \$1 million state grant, will proceed with 127-unit Fruit Valley workforce project

A \$1 million award from the state Housing Trust Fund means that the Vancouver Housing Authority can proceed with its proposed 127-unit Plum Meadows workforce housing development in Fruit Valley.

VHA CEO **Kurt Creager** says the award is the final piece in an \$18.17 million funding package, of which \$11 million will be in bonds, and which will be repaid from rental revenues.

According to Creager, the Plum Meadows will be a non-subsidized workforce housing development. Because the debt on the project will be relatively low, rents will be affordable for households at or below 60 percent of the area median income.

Plum Meadows will be built at the 7.43-acre site of the former Fruit Valley School on Fruit Valley Road. Creager says that the duplexes and apartments designed by Otak will be built with a variety of roof silhouettes to blend in with the single-family neighborhood.

Construction will begin in August and will be complete within a year.

The Vancouver Housing Authority serves over 7,000 very low-income people with 1,720 rental assistance vouchers, 949 units of subsidized housing and four homeless shelters. Creager says the housing authority has a waiting list of over 3,000 households.

## Salmon returning in record numbers

The number of returning adult spring Chinook salmon passing Bonneville Dam on the Columbia River this year has topped 192,000, making it the fourth largest count since record keeping began in 1938, reports Bonneville Power Administration administrator **Steve Wright**.

"This year's good return of spring Chinook is yet another indication that the investments in fish recovery are paying off," says Wright.

National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration fisheries biologists said good ocean conditions were a major factor in the strong numbers. However, they also said the returns indicate that sufficient numbers of juvenile fish made it past the hydro system in 2001 to take advantage of the good conditions.

This is the fourth year in a row of good returns. Next year's run should be solid also, according to Wright.
