## Evergreen School District board ratifies two-year teacher contract

A two-year contract with Evergreen School District teachers was unanimously approved by the district's board yesterday, providing for improvements in compensation for about 1,400 teachers.

The new package will have an impact on the district of about \$1.7 million over the next two years.

Teachers will be reimbursed for some costs not now compensable and will be paid for additional amounts of time they devote to work performed beyond contract requirements.

Both district superintendent **Rick Melching**, and the Evergreen Education Association president **Jim Schaefer** agreed the new contract, supported by over 97 percent of the teachers, is a good one.
