Hakan Gurocak named director of WSU's new Institute for Engineering and Science

Hakan Gurocak, director of engineering and computer science programs at Washington State University Vancouver, has been named director of the new WSU Vancouver Institute for Engineering and Science.

The Vancouver-based institute is a public-private partnership in collaboration with Clark and Lower Columbia Colleges that will offer seamless, four-year degrees to students in southwest Washington beginning in September 2004.



"The institute will expand

higher education access in disciplines that are particularly important to the area's high-technology employers," says WSU Vancouver chancellor **Hal Dengerink**.

"Dr. Gurocak's extensive background in engineering and research, his personal commitment to teaching and an impressive record of collaboration with area industry make him the ideal choice to direct the new institute."

Gurocak, who has been a professor of manufacturing engineering at WSU Vancouver since 1997, has brought to the Vancouver campus more than \$1 million in industry equipment donations and grants funded by the National Science Foundation and the Society of Manufacturing Engineers Education Association.

He chairs the manufacturing division of the American Society for Engineering and Education

Revenues up for Clark Public Utilities

Electricity sales revenues were higher than expected and expenses were below expectations, during the first half of the year, Clark Public Utilities' director of finance **Rick Dyer** reported to utility commissioners this week.

The electric utility's net income for the first half of 2003 was \$3.3 million, more than double of what was expected, he said.

Water sales revenues were also ahead of projections.

Residential customer growth was less than last year, but nonetheless the utility added 1,436 new residential customers—an annual rate of growth of nearly 2 percent.

Clark's water utility grew by 429 customers in the first half of the year, a growth rate of 3.27 percent. The water utility serves the populous Hazel Dell-Salmon Creek area.
