New library Internet access software on tap for next week; further changes possible

Even though the Fort Vancouver Regional Library district is making its new Internet access management software operational next week, the policy may change again later in the year, according to district executive director **Bruce Ziegman**.

Internet access in seven Clark County libraries will be interrupted during different days of the week as the software is installed.

The software allows implementation of the district's revised policy on Internet filtering for children, adopted last year.

The policy calls for a 'filter-on' default for children 12 years old and younger and offers parents the ability to override Internet access choices for their children up to the age of 18.

"The policy may change again later this year when the library board responds to the recently upheld federal Children's Internet Protection Act," Ziegman says. "The versatile software which can accommodate such changes also allows for on-line Internet reservations for time slots."

Construction to start on first of two Ridgefield soccer fields; \$30,000 needed to start second

Ridgefield community volunteers have raised \$50,000 in cash and \$75,000 in in-kind donations to cover the cost of building the first of two soccer fields at Ridgefield High School. Groundbreaking is at 1:30 p.m. Monday, Aug. 11.

According to spokesperson for the project **Mark Burton**, \$30,000 is needed to build the second field. The two fields are part of a plan put together between the Lewis River Soccer Club and the Ridgefield School District to give the community and school better access to soccer.

Currently, Ridgefield High School soccer practices and games are played at View Ridge Middle School.

Red Cross Disaster team goes into action

Tuesday morning, within a few hours of an early morning fire that destroyed a Camas home, a three-member volunteer disaster action team from the American Red Cross Clark County Chapter was providing assistance to the two families burned out of the home.

None of the seven persons in the home at the time of the fire was injured.

The volunteers spend six hours working the families, providing vouchers for food, clothing and shelter. Additional assistance is available, according to Red Cross spokesperson **Shawna Burkholder**.

Burkholder says the Red Cross provides free assistance to those displaced by local disasters. Last year the Clark County Chapter mobilized relief to victims of 102 disasters and provided them with over \$53,000 in assistance. The local chapter provided support to 1,545 people, trained 22,738 people in lifesaving skills, collected 17,893 pints of blood and transmitted 306 emergency messages to members of the armed forces and their families.
