The eight candidates for the Vancouver City Council position being vacated by state Rep. Jim Moeller (D-49th) have been invited to a public forum sponsored by the Clark County Central Labor Council at 11 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 11, in the Firefighters Union Hall, 2807 Fruit Valley Road.

The labor council is expected to endorse a candidate.

Vancouver Mayor Royce Pollard and the five remaining councilors will vote in public on the final selection Monday, Jan. 13, following a three-hour session of public interviews in City Hall. The winner will be sworn in on Jan. 27 and will serve for a year. The position will be on the November 2003 ballot.

The eight, survivors of a list of 23 applicants for the job, are Marc Berg, John Caton, Stephen Fitton, D. Michael Heywood, Michael Kissinger, Tim Leavitt, Lisa Morrison and Michael Teefy.
